

SteamRanger's Heritage - an insight into our past

SACKGROUND

Our Victorian colleagues arranged a very impressive interstate tour in June 1981 which brought their "K" class loco to South Australia

A substantial package of local tours was included as outlined in the pages from the Tours Brochure attached.

The K class were built to satisfy a need in Victoria for a powerful engine to operate on light lines and the first 10 were built at Newport in 1922-1923. A further 43 of these engines, including 190, were built between 1940 and 1946.

K190 underwent a major overhaul during 1965 and saw service from December 1967 to July 1968 and then placed in storage at Ararat. It was moved from Ararat to Bendigo in June 1976 to replace another K as workshops pilot but it failed shortly after re-entering service and was promptly stored at Bendigo until 12/5/79 when it was obtained by Steamrail Victoria and transferred to Bayswater in Melbourne where repairs were made to make the loco serviceable to join K153 and K184 as Steamrails fleet for enthusiast train journeys on Vicrail tracks. K190 ran its first trip under the auspices of Steamrail on 13/9/79.

Early in the planning for the Easter steam happening at Peterborough it was intended to bring a locomotive from Victoria to participate but circumstances at the time prevented that event from occurring. Negotiations were in an advanced stage when the decision was made and ARMS Steamranger Tours decided not to waste the opportunity of having a Victorian steam locomotive in South Australia and Steamrail responded by preparing K190 for the trip.

In terms of tractive effort the 2-8-0 K class'Consolidation' is mid-way between the 520 and 620 class of ex SAR locomotives. The following table shows a comparison set of figures in the imperial measure for the three classes of locomotive.

A green K class steam engine is coming to South Australia! Yes, after an epic 777 km journey from Melbourne, Victorian engine No. 190 will arrive in Adelaide on Saturday 23rd May. It's here for a 2 week stay and in that brief time South Australians will have a number of opportunities to ride behind it. Make the most of it as we don't expect to be able to repeat this exceptional treat for those who love steam trains. It will be a festival of steam the like of which has never been enjoyed in South Australia before.

The only main line steam engines preserved in working order in Victoria are K class locos and they have always been a favourite. K190 is a medium powered locomotive with plenty of get up and go and it boasts a wonderfully melodious chime whistle. To hear a K class beating across the countryside whistling occasionally for a level crossing is pure magic. Let's share a bit of the magic with you!

A trip to meet the K at Tailem Bend

"MEET THE K"

SATURDAY 23RD MAY

The most exciting trip of all. Join our train at either Dry Creek station or Keswick and let's tackle the mountains with two Rx class steam locomotives. The twin bark of our veterans up the steep grades is guaranteed to delight you - it will be a magnificent spectacle and a marvellous experience to be on this train. At Bridgewater Rx 224 will be detached and the superheater No. 207 will carry on alone hauling our train. Still some grades to tackle such as the long pull out of Balhannah and up the notorious Warla bank. Bound to be some good steam music there.

Before lunch we'll be at Tailem Bend to meet the K. After servicing, watering and fuelling Rx 207 it will be coupled to K190 and the combined Victorian and South Australian trains for the run back to Dry Creek. What a saga! This surely will be the most remarkable steam journey in South Australia. To capture it for all time there will be superb photo stops in the most rugged sections of the Mount Lofty Ranges which even the most ardent motorists will find it difficult to reach. So give yourself the treat of a lifetime and build up a few wonderful memories.

<u>TIMES:</u> Dry Creek depart 7.15 a.m. - Keswick depart 7.32 a.m. - Blackwood depart 8.10 a.m. Back at Dry Creek by 6.15 p.m. and other stations correspondingly earlier.

Note: This train does not call at Adelaide station in either direction.

"NOARLUNGA MEANDERER"

SUNDAY 24TH MAY

a significant date in railway history. For the very first time a Victorian K class steam locomotive will depart from Adelaide station. Actually we are bound for Noarlunga Centre, but first we are off to a number of other interesting places. We'll call at Outer Harbour then take the Rosewater loop to Dry Creek and hopefully explore the interesting branch line through Penfield with its sharp balloon loop. Back again to Dry Creek after a fast sprint across the plains. Here the head end power will be increased by attaching an Rx class steam locomotive for the severe grades out of Brighton.

Enjoy the two steamers storming up the Seacliff bank and then the picturesque coastal scenery through to South Australia's most modern rail-bus interchange complex at Noarlunga Centre. Should be great fum. 142 km of K class travel - twice as far as to Bridgewater and back.
